COVID update

You may be aware that the government has announced a move to orange settings. This is positive news as it means health advice reflects that Aotearoa / New Zealand is showing clear signs that Omicron has peaked in some areas or is soon to peak. As case numbers come down, our health system is more able to cope, so the restrictions are reducing.

No changes at school until Term 2

The changes announced today will come into effect in schools in Term 2. The Ministry of Education has said, "retain your current settings at school so that you have time to plan for any changes. For example, maintain the expectation that students in Years 4 and up (and staff) continue to wear masks until the end of the term."

At **Orange**, **masks remain an important tool** to reduce the spread of COVID-19 and public health advice strongly encourages their continued use indoors. Many health experts are supporting this view.

Wearing a mask is a key health measure that slows the spread of COVID-19 in indoor settings. For that reason, we continue to ask that visitors to the school, including parents and whānau, wear a mask whenever they are indoors in the school.

Next term at Orange

Next term we ask that taiohi continue to bring a mask to school every day. There may be times that we'll ask them to wear a mask – for example, when we are having an assembly in the hall. If there are several cases at school or in the community, we may ask that masks are worn in classrooms also.

Students are still required to wear a face mask on school or public transport. This will also include school vans for activities, such as trips and sport.

We will continue to keep all the other health measures in place at school that we know slow the spread of COVID-19. These include ensuring our indoor spaces are well-ventilated, maintaining good hand hygiene and cough and sneeze etiquette, appropriate physical distancing whenever we can and, most importantly, staying home if we are sick.

As a school and as an employer we need ensure the safest environment possible and have settings that are fit for purpose. We appreciate all the support we haver had to date and the need to continue to be flexible and cooperative.

- Masks are strongly encouraged to be worn when indoors and are required for children aged 12 and over on school transport.
- As at Red, there will be no mask requirements when outdoors.
- All parents, caregivers, whānau, and other visitors are asked to wear face masks on site when indoors.
- There will be no outdoor capacity limits.
- Indoor capacity limits are also removed. However, for non-curriculum related events and activities we will use allocated seating for large events (such as those with more than 500 people) or apply a maximum capacity limit based on the maximum number of people who could occupy the space if each person was one metre apart.

Summary of all settings

Note that the need to self-isolate is someone tests positive remains the same or if you live with someone who has COVID-19.
