## Covid-19 update

Thanks for continuing to follow the rules about staying at home if sick, getting tested, and reporting to the school. It is essential to keep up to date with how much COVID is in our community so we can respond appropriately, so we really appreciate being told about positive cases and household close contacts.

As advised earlier the school will do our best to keep everyone safe, and that includes strongly encouraging mask use. Inside both by staff and students. We will continue to monitor cases in our area to decide if we need to insist on mask use, as it is an effective way to reduce transmission, along with great hygiene practices, ventilation and, of course, staying at home when sick or a household close contact.

You may have seen news articles in the last few days that suggest that staff in schools may be getting infected at a higher rate than the general population. We will monitor the situation in our school and this may require us to insist that masks are worn. In some circumstances we will insist in some classes as we may have staff or students that are immunocompromised. Please advise the school if your child is particularly at risk of infections.

Mask use is still compulsory on school transport, including school vans and we would appreciate parents ensuring their children have appropriate masks. We have provided lots of masks. It is a condition of transport to follow all guidelines and we do not want to be put into a position to deny transport.

Lets continue to work together to make sure face-toface learning continues. We are so fortunate that we haven't had to roster home or close the school as many schools have had to.

# Matariki celebration

Matariki is a special occasion in the New Zealand calendar which marks the start of the Māori New Year.

Signified by the Matariki cluster of stars reappearing in our night sky, this is a time to reflect on the past year, celebrate the present, and plan for the year ahead.

Matariki is a star cluster that appears in the early morning sky in New Zealand during the mid-winter months.

The star cluster is well known throughout the world and at different times of the year can be seen around the globe. It is one of the brightest clusters in the sky, containing hundreds of member stars.

During Term 2 our junior school, primarily at Year 9, Learning Areas have taken a variety of approaches to make explicit connections to Matariki in the learning programme. One example is in Year 9 English, taiohi are working on a novel study of <u>Charlie Tangaroa and the Creature from</u> <u>the Sea</u> which has connections to atua (Tāne and Tangaroa) as does Matariki.
